In the name of God amen, in the year of our Lord 1750 of rather  
weak in the body, but sound in memory, but not knowing how soon I may  
die, I do declare and ordain, this to be my last Will and Testament,  
In the first place I recommend my soul into the hands of God, that  
gave it, hoping that it may be received into the Number of his elect  
with a firm persuasion that my glorious redeemer liveth, and will  
come with a glorious Retinue at the last day to judge both the quick  
and the dead, and as for my frail body, I recommend it to be  
buried in a decent manner, and as for the small Estate with which  
it hath pleased God to bless me with, I dispose of it in the manner  
following, and first I order that my just debts be paid hereafter,  
I give unto my son Alexander Hamilton, one Negro Woman named  
Rose, and her increase, also my table and gown, giving part  
to him and his Heirs forever,  
I give to my son Patrick Hamilton, one Negro Patrick Hamilton one  
Negro boy named Isaac to him and his Heirs forever,  
I give to my son Robert Hamilton, one Negro boy named Joe, also one  
Horse named Jack, one Colt, and one flea wheel, to him and his Heirs forever,  
I give unto my daughter Jean Joyce, one Negro boy named Sam, also one  
wollen gown, one Cotton gown, and two Red shales, to her and her Heirs  
forever,  
I give unto my daughter Mrs. Hannah, two of my best Cows  
and my best bed and furniture.
